From the Pastor

Holy Week and Easter

Holy Week, 2019, will be my 38th since ordination. It's been my practice in all three congregations I've served to observe this holiest of weeks with daily worship (except Saturday). When I was younger, this worship took the form of daily Eucharists – meaning daily sermons Sunday through Sunday. Thanks to the generosity and ingenuity of St. Timothy's Worship Committee, we've modified our Holy Week schedule over the years, and the result is quite pleasing.

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, the Sunday of the Passion. This year, members of our confirmation class will join me in reading the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to St. Luke. As we read Luke's account of the Last Supper, Jesus' betrayal, his arrest, trial, and crucifixion, we receive a solemn preview of the week to come. What begins with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem ends with rejection, humiliation, violence, and death.

Monday follows with Stations of the Cross, a moving service of prayer, readings, and song, that traces the footsteps of our Savior from trial to crucifixion. Originating as a sacred pilgrimage for those who couldn't afford a trip to Jerusalem, the Way of the Cross continues to humble and inspire the faithful.

Tuesday evening brings a very special Eucharistic service — "Table Communion." We gather at tables in the Fellowship Hall in an intimate way that recalls Christ's gathering for the Passover Seder on the night of his betrayal.

We return to the sanctuary on Wednesday evening for Evening Prayer. This ancient service of song and prayer comes to us from the monastic tradition, where the faithful gathered to pray "the hours." The simple beauty of vespers, sung with Marie Beyer's flute accompaniment offers quiet midweek contemplation in anticipation of the momentous days to come.

Maundy Thursday's service begins with the sermon, followed by individual absolution. We gathered on Ash Wednesday to confess our sins and acknowledge our fallen humanity. Absolution has been withheld throughout Lent, but it is granted once again on the night in which Jesus was betrayed. Remembering his last meal with the disciples, we gather for the Sacrament of Holy Communion. When all have communed, the altar is stripped and the chancel is laid bare.

Austerity is the mood on Good Friday; the altar and pulpit are devoid of any decoration, and the liturgy is spare. I lead the congregation in the Bidding Prayer, ancient petitions that are sung and spoken. John's account of Jesus' passion is read, interspersed with the beautiful hymns of the passion, and the extinguishing of seven candles, symbolizing Christ's last words and the ebbing of his life. In the darkness a bell tolls 33 times — one for each year of Jesus earthly existence — and the book of life is slammed shut.

While the Lord ministers to the souls in Hades, we take Saturday off. In my younger days, I participated or hosted Easter Vigils – the first liturgy of the Easter season – on Holy Saturday. These days we wait until morning to celebrate the resurrection, which we do with festival services at 8:30 and 11:00 am. Please join us throughout the week to participate in the story of our salvation!

It's easy to just go along with the group you are in. It's much harder to voice a different opinion. They might call a student a name in teasing and that's all that was needed to start students taunting that student. (Relief that it wasn't me and thank goodness the focus is off me).

It seems today that this behavior is out of school and into everyday life. And now we add evil. You are evil because you have a different opinion. No more researching subjects to get more information. No more understanding that others experiences are different from yours. No more discussion. No debates. No more listening to others! What are you doing to change this?

People listened to Jesus. Some followed him, some crucified him. How is your research going? Are you listening?

Happy Easter. He is risen!

A Note to our Senior Veterans



Many of you may have already filed your income taxes and may know about the veterans tax exemption in New Jersey. But if you are not aware, while it is too late if you have filed, you might already start the process for next year. It is, indeed, a process!

As a veteran you are eligible for a \$3,000 exemption on your Income Tax return if you are a military veteran who was honorably discharged or released under honorable circumstances from active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States on or any time before the last day of the tax year. To claim this exemption you must prove your eligibility by sending your DD 214 or another approved document such

as documentation from your branch of service. It must show the character of discharge and if using your DD 214 it must have the number 4 on the bottom right-hand corner. You only need to do this once. It will remain in effect going forward. Please visit https://www.state.nj.us/treasury/taxation/military/vetexemption-documentation.shtml for more information.

While this exemption has been in place about two years, Trenton is well behind in processing these requests. In my husband's case it took almost a half year for them to respond that there was a problem with his DD 214. A visit to our Passaic County Veterans Representative proved there was not a problem and he resubmitted the form. Four months later Joe received another letter as his DD 214 had a 2 rather than a 4. The process does take time. Until you have received word from Trenton that your form has been accepted you cannot claim the exemption.

Despite the obstacles, there is still time this year if you appeal to your State Senator. We went to Senator Kristen Corrado. In one day her associate submitted the DD 214 and we heard back that it was approved. Never hesitate to reach out to your State Senator or Representative.

Even as the daughter of a Marine and wife of a Marine I never fully appreciated their service until Bill Monsees spoke of young boys in his high school class who left school to serve in World War II only to complete their education on their return home. It is hard to even imagine that happening today. Through the advocacy of people like Kristen Corrado, New Jersey does have benefits and programs for our Veterans and they are well deserved, but not always widely publicized. EYEGLASS COLLECTION

We will no longer be collecting <u>prescription</u> eyeglasses at St. Timothy. However, Heart 'n Hands will continue to collect <u>over-the-counter</u> <u>reading</u> glasses. There is still a need for prescription eyeglasses and there are a number of ways that you may donate:



- 1) There is a receptacle in front of the Wayne municipal building for eyeglasses. Many post offices throughout New Jersey have receptacles (such as the Sheffield location in Wayne).
- 2) You may donate prescription glasses to LensCrafters, Pearle, or Sears Optical store locations throughout New Jersey for distribution to poor communities through OneSight charity.
- 3) The Lions Club International has distribution centers in New Jersey. They pick up glasses at any Walmart that has a vision center such as: Cedar Knolls, Garfield, or Riverdale. You may also go to http://www.njlerc.org/donations.html for a listing of Lions Club donation centers throughout New Jersey.

Please remember that although we are no longer collecting <u>prescription</u> eyeglasses there is still a need for <u>over-the-counter reading</u> glasses that Heart 'n Hands is responding to through the ministries they serve. 
