From the Pastor

Lent at Last!

Lent is the Church's period of preparation for celebrating the mystery of our redemption. Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter – Passion and Resurrection – are the proclamation and celebration of this mystery. Please plan to spend these 40 days of penitential preparation practicing the disciplines of Lent here at St. Timothy.

Ash Wednesday

Lent arrives late this year with Ash Wednesday on March 6 and Easter on April 21 (remember last year when Ash Wednesday fell on Valentine's Day and Easter on April Fools' Day?). Early or late, Lent arrives, and with it the traditions and observances to which we've become accustomed. On Ash Wednesday we'll worship twice: our spoken liturgy takes place at noon, and our sung service at 7:30 pm. Both liturgies begin with an order of corporate confession, followed by the imposition of ashes. Holy Communion is also offered at both services. Ash Wednesday is an important observance for the Christian. We acknowledge the limits of our humanity, by confessing our short-comings and wearing a sign of our penitence. Everyone is encouraged to join us on March 6.

Soup and Study

Beginning on Wednesday, March 13, and continuing for the next four weeks, we'll gather for a simply meal at 6:00 pm and continue with prayer and study at 7:00 pm. Our study this year will be of favorite hymns. Since Christmas there has been a sheet on the Happenings Bulletin Board asking our members to list their favorite hymns. These, along with several others, will be the focus of this year's Wednesday studies. We'll have a chance to sing a verse of two of each, followed by examinations of each hymn's history, author and/or composer, biblical citations contained within the hymn, as well as personal reflections upon its meaning.



Heart 'n Hands Mission







OVERWHELMED BY PRESCRIPTION DRUG COSTS?

There are several services that help with the cost of these drugs.



CommunitycaresRX.com: One can obtain a membership card, free of charge and no income restrictions by going to this site online or calling (800) 535-0750

leaving your name and address at the message prompt. On the site you can put in the name of your drug, the strength, amount needed, and zip code. A page will be displayed with pharmacies in the area that accept the CommunitycaresRX card as well as the cost. The cost at pharmacies varies. On generic drugs the savings is as much as 40-70% off; on brand names the savings is about 20% off.



GoodRX.com: There is no membership card with this service and no income restrictions. The same information (drug name, strength, amount, and zip code) is entered on the site and a page will appear with coupons for pharmacies that accept

the GoodRX coupons. The prescription must be an exact match to the coupon; that is name, strength, and amount. The website does a good job of explaining the program but you can also call with questions at 855-268-2822.

EYEGLASS COLLECTION

We will no longer be collecting <u>prescription</u> eyeglasses at St. Timothy. However, Heart 'n Hands will continue to collect <u>over-the-counter</u> <u>reading</u> glasses. There is still a need for prescription eyeglasses and there are a number of ways that you may donate:



- 1) There is a receptacle in front of the Wayne municipal building for eyeglasses. Many post offices throughout New Jersey have receptacles (such as the Sheffield location in Wayne).
- 2) You may donate prescription glasses to LensCrafters, Pearle, or Sears Optical store locations throughout New Jersey for distribution to poor communities through OneSight charity.
- 3) The Lions Club International has distribution centers in New Jersey. They pick up glasses at any Walmart that has a vision center such as: Cedar Knolls, Garfield, or Riverdale. You may also go to http://www.njlerc.org/donations.html for a listing of Lions Club donation centers throughout New Jersey.

Please remember that although we are no longer collecting <u>prescription</u> eyeglasses there is still a need for <u>over-the-counter reading</u> glasses that Heart 'n Hands is responding to through the ministries they serve. STEW SUNDAY • MARCH 10th

Will you consider making a batch of stew for the guests at Eva's Kitchen in Paterson? We always hear words of gratitude from the guests at Eva's Kitchen for the meal prepared for them.

Once again we are joining with the congregation of Immaculate Heart of Mary to provide this nourishing meal. The past few times we've participated in Stew Sunday we've just about been able to serve everyone. The number of guests continues to grow. We always hope for left-over stew as this is distributed to a women's shelter.



The stew should be put into toss-away containers and brought to the church **either Saturday night or Sunday before 10:00 a.m.** You may also bring it on Friday during office hours (9-12). On Sunday at 10:00 the stews from St. Timothy are loaded up for transport to Eva's Kitchen.

As we need a count of stews, please sign up on the bulletin board across from the elevator or let Eileen Smith or Laura Dec know that you will be cooking. The recipe follows. Thank you!

STEW SUNDAY RECIPE

3 lbs. stew meat - cut in 1½ inch chunks
1/3 cup all-purpose flour
1/3 cup salad oil
1 large onion, chopped
1 clove garlic, minced
4 beef bouillon cubes (or envelopes)

1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1/2 teaspoon pepper
6 medium potatoes, cut in chunks
1 16 oz. bag carrots, cut in chunks
1 10 oz. package frozen peas

Dredge meat in flour. Sauté meat, a few pieces at a time in oil, until well browned on all sides. Remove pieces as they brown and continue cooking other pieces.

Reduce heat to medium. Add chopped onion and garlic to drippings and cook until onion is almost tender, but not brown. Stir in 3 cups water, bouillon, salt, Worcestershire, and pepper - stirring occasionally until it comes to a boil. Add meat and cover. Simmer 2½ hours.

Add potatoes and carrot chunks. Cover and simmer 20 minutes. Stir in frozen peas and simmer 5 minutes.


