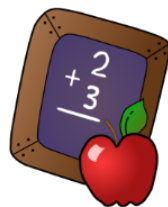

From the Pastor

A Word from our Bishop regarding the ELCA Churchwide Assembly

While our denomination usually flies under the radar of mass media, last week's Churchwide Assembly drew attention when the ELCA approved a memorial naming the ours a "sanctuary church body." Several of you have asked me what this means, and I had to confess that I was not sure. Our Bishop, the Rev. Tracie Bartholomew sent out an email yesterday which explains her understanding of the vote. The following is an abridgement of that email.

Dear Friends,

I just returned from our ELCA Churchwide Assembly, along with almost 1000 other voting members (including 13 others from our synod¹)...

... While the assembly engaged in a lot of work and stopped for worship in the middle of each day, I have only seen headlines about two actions – a prayer walk to the ICE office in Milwaukee and the approval of a memorial naming the ELCA a sanctuary church body. Both actions are public witnesses to our standing with refugees and asylum seekers, working for improved immigration policies, accompanying the most vulnerable among us, and praying for all who seek safer homes. Praying for an end to the detention of children seeking asylum and an end for the separation of families at our southern border is in line with the biblical call to love our neighbors.

The word “sanctuary” when used in the context of immigration, can be understood in many ways; there is no legal definition of sanctuary. For some, the word elicits an emotional response, even without being sure what it means. In 2016, the ELCA adopted the AMMPARO strategy which speaks about sanctuary as everything from holding English classes to housing people to writing to congress – all of these are ways of being sanctuary. This action does not ask for anyone to engage in illegal behavior.

Because we are church in three expressions (congregations, synods, and churchwide) the decision made at the Churchwide Assembly to become a sanctuary church body, only applies to the churchwide expression. Any congregation or synod wishing to become a sanctuary entity is free to decide to do so, or not. No congregation or synod is compelled to take on that designation. If a congregation wishes to become a sanctuary entity, it should also decide what that will mean.

We have congregations in our synod that already do the work of being sanctuary, some with an official designation and others working quietly behind the scenes. As a synod, we are committed to calling for immigration reform, to supporting a ministry for those in the Elizabeth Detention Center (under the leadership of Pastor Ramon Collazo), and to working with neighbors who make NJ home. This commitment is long-standing and unwavering.

In the coming weeks, the voting members from our synod will share reflections of the Churchwide Assembly with you through Jersey Jottings. I hope you will read them and then thank those who gathered for this holy time of being church. Behind the headlines and social media posts, the Holy Spirit called, gathered, and breathed life into the assembly. I am grateful to be a part of such a church.

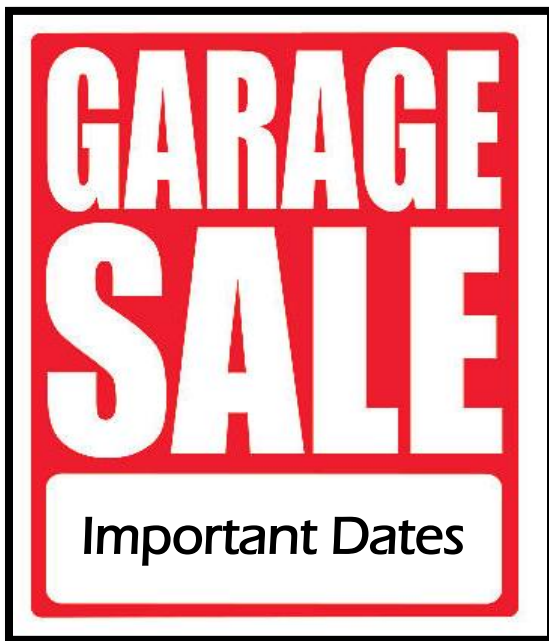

Creativity and Aging

There are many things we do as seniors to live well including annual check-ups (or maybe more frequently), proper nutrition, physical activity, and exercises for our mind such as word games. Another way to keep our mind healthy is art therapy.

In a study published in the Journal on Aging it was noted that seniors, aged 60-93, identified six features of successful aging: a sense of purpose, interactions with others, personal growth, self-acceptance, autonomy, and health. It was noted that creative activities such as writing, painting, or knitting encourage a sense of competence, purpose, and growth. Arts and crafts help alleviate boredom and keep seniors' minds busy as well as help with hand-eye coordination, cognitive abilities, and concentration.

Sometimes we don't get involved with creative activities as we don't see ourselves as artistic. But there are many ways to express one's creativity that can be done with things we have around the house such as taking out a lifetime of photographs and arranging them in a collage or scrap book.

At our next Prime Timers (see below) we will have fun in a session of crafting - painting rocks! As one who doesn't have much artistic ability, I'm hoping that this exercise will prompt me to do more crafting - and I hope you'll join in as well!

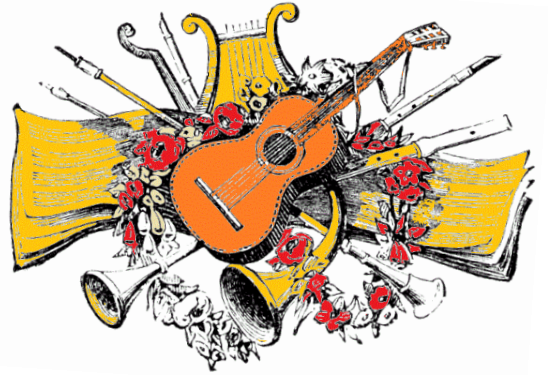

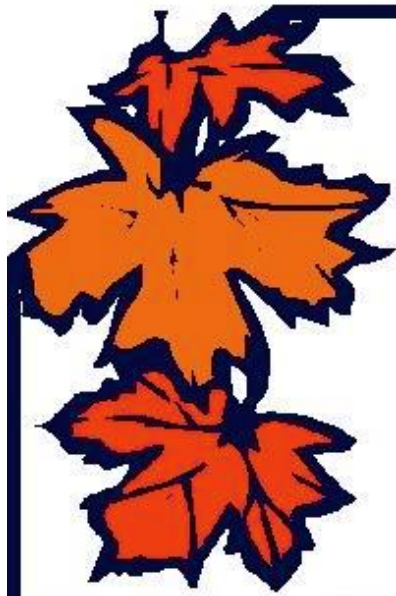

Stew Sunday • September 22, 2019

Will you consider making a batch of stew for the guests at Eva's Kitchen in Paterson? We always hear words of gratitude from the guests at Eva's Kitchen for the meal prepared for them.



Once again we are joining with the congregation of Immaculate Heart of Mary to provide this nourishing meal. The past few times we've participated in Stew Sunday we've just about been able to serve everyone. The number of guests continues to grow. We always hope for left-over stew as this is distributed to a women's shelter.

The stew should be put into toss-away containers and brought to the church **either Saturday night or Sunday before 10:00 a.m.** You may also bring it on Friday during office hours (9-12). On Sunday at 10:00 the stews from St. Timothy are loaded up for transport to Eva's Kitchen.

As we need a count of stews, please sign up on the bulletin board across from the elevator or let Eileen Smith or Laura Dec know that you will be cooking. The recipe follows. Thank you!

STEW SUNDAY RECIPE

| | |
|---|-------------------------------------|
| 3 lbs. stew meat - cut in 1 1/2 inch chunks | 1 teaspoon salt |
| 1/3 cup all purpose flour | 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce |
| 1/3 cup salad oil | 1/2 teaspoon pepper |
| 1 large onion, chopped | 6 medium potatoes, cut in chunks |
| 1 clove garlic, minced | 1 16 oz. bag carrots, cut in chunks |
| 4 beef bouillon cubes (or envelopes) | 1 10 oz. package frozen peas |

Dredge meat in flour. Sauté meat, a few pieces at a time in oil, until well browned on all sides. Remove pieces as they brown and continue cooking other pieces.

Reduce heat to medium. Add chopped onion and garlic to drippings and cook until onion is almost tender, but not brown. Stir in 3 cups water, bouillon, salt, Worcestershire, and pepper - stirring occasionally until it comes to a boil. Add meat and cover. Simmer 2½ hours.

Add potatoes and carrot chunks. Cover and simmer 20 minutes. Stir in frozen peas and simmer 5 minutes.

Bosnia IST

We were told the young boy in the wheelchair had rarely been out of his home. His school system could not provide the services he needed and he wasn't required to go to school. He joined in the games slowly his smile growing as we all joined Larry "Gaga" Olson in song, "Building Bridges across the ocean, Building Bridges of love". When the parachute came out he stared in amazement at the colors and all the other children running underneath it. Our

interpreter Samir looked down and asked him and his mother if he would like to go under the parachute too. They responded yes and Samir scooped him up and ran him from one side to the other. The rest of camp was full of smiles and laughter for this young boy, when we asked him at the end of the day if he enjoyed it he responded. "It was the best day of my life."



Despite the heat and some health challenges this years trip was as fun and fulfilling as ever. Over 900 children and teachers attended the camps (a 3 year high) including 10 schools at Camp New Hope (CNH) with 3 experiencing multi-ethnic fellowship for the first time. Teacher Damir, whom I met last year summed CNH up this way, "This camp proves we can live together and disproves what our politicians are telling us."

This ministry transforms people both those who travel to BiH and those we meet there. Many of the young people who have traveled there have embarked on service careers influenced by this experience. You meet new people who open their hearts and homes to you and you become friends, you go again (and again) and you become family. You help your family. St Timothy as I have reported in past TIPS this ministry is at a crossroads. Our leadership is changing but a core group of the team is determined that this year not be the last. As the only international hands on service opportunity within our church we feel for that reason, among others, it's important to continue. While expenses were well with our budget, donations this year were down. We ended the trip with a deficit of approximately \$12,000 a not insignificant but not insurmountable amount. Synod council meets the end of this month (September) at which time they will vote on whether to endorse this effort for next year. Erasing as much of this deficit this month is critical in that decision.

I know of several St Timothy youth interested in going next year. If you can join me in making a donation this month, of any amount, we can hopefully give them the opportunity as well as give a child in BiH the "best day of their life". 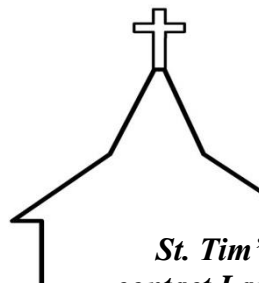
