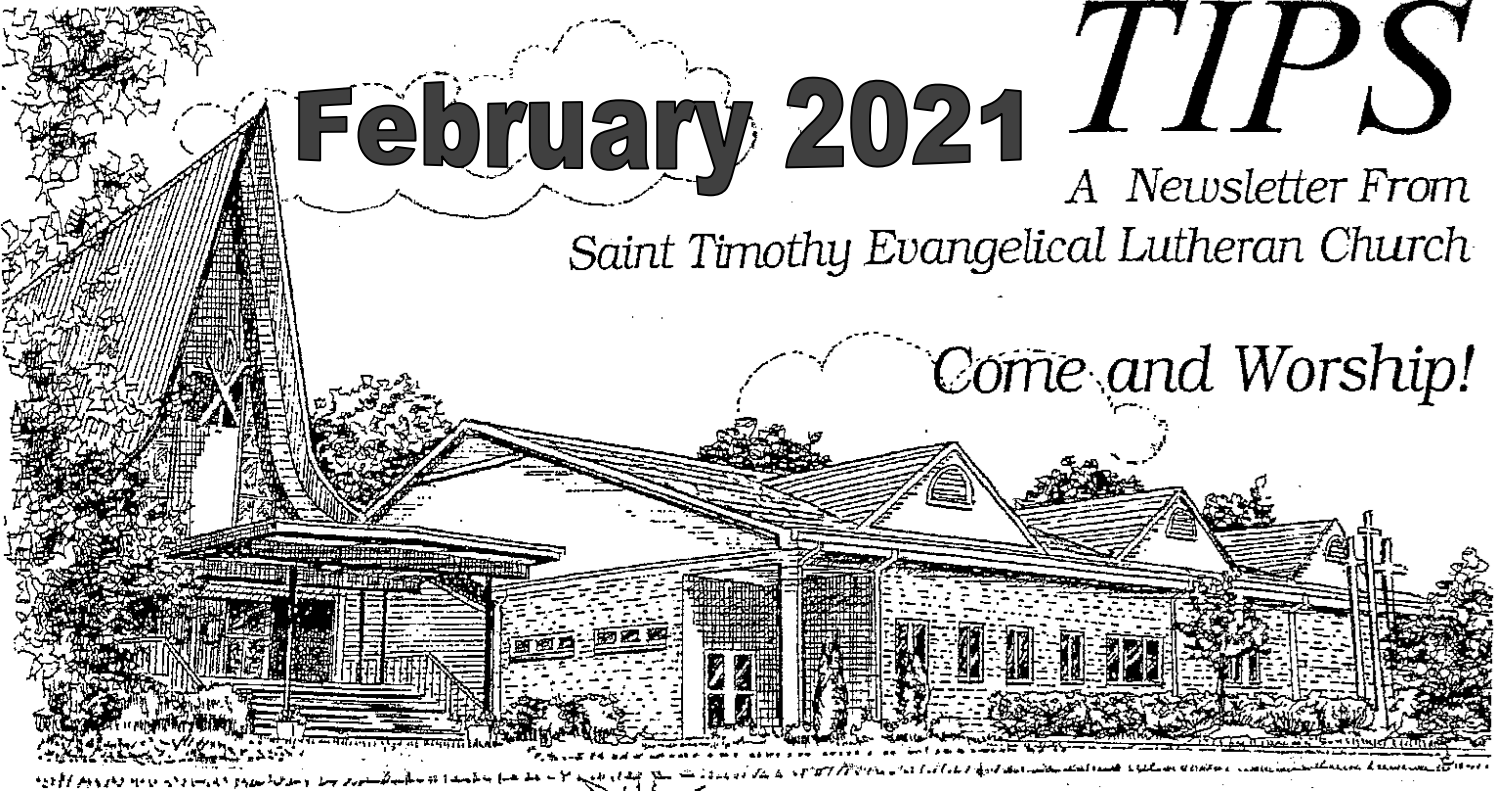

When Jesus Comes to Town....

This Coming Sunday's Scripture talks about a healing story of Jesus' opening days as he enters a new town at the start of his ministry.

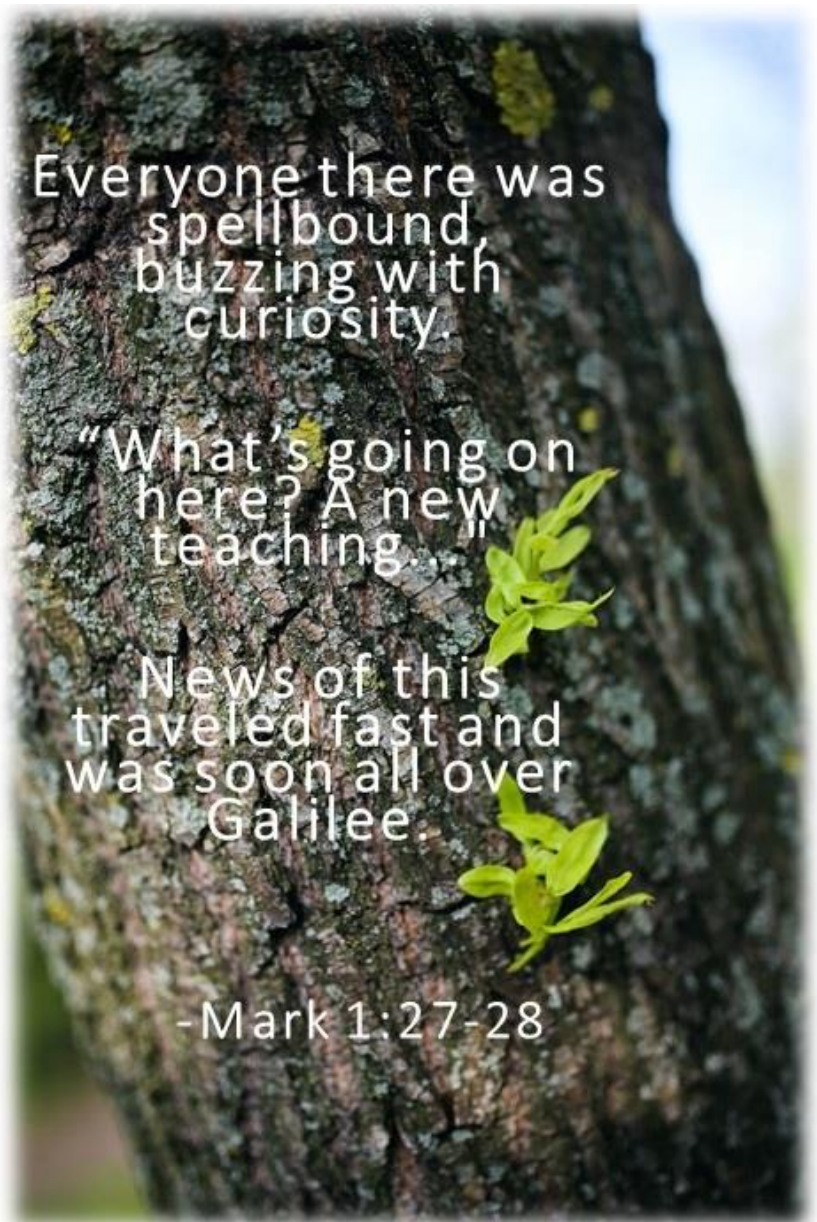
In Jesus' healing stories it is very easy to miss the community's influence. We more often focus our attention on the healing miracle itself or the person being healed and often miss other details like the people in attendance.

We could think of them as if they were backup singers in a song or the chorus of classic Greek play.

The backup singers of a song add harmony, dimension and context to the song making it a much richer experience.

The chorus in a Greek play had an important role too. The chorus was a group of actors who described and commented upon the main action of the play using singing, dancing, and recitation. The chorus helps the audience to become a part of the story.

The chorus is like having all your aunts, uncles and grandparents

commenting on your life. As background figures the chorus and commentators help us, the audience get a perspective of what's happening and help us get into the story.

Even though it seems to be operating only in the background, the community in Jesus' stories is a like a chorus but much more, it is a vital part of what's happening.

For example, in Disney's "Beauty and the Beast," it's the background community of castle servants who work to transform the lives of Belle and Beast and help them find friendship and hope for a new future together.



The community in Mark's story for this Sunday's reading plays an important role in Jesus' ministry. The presence of the community is not merely incidental; its presence is intentional pushing well beyond the "oohs" and "ahhs" that we read in Mark's gospel.

Major transformations and substantive changes take place that affect the dynamics and very future of what happens when Jesus comes to town. These important changes are played out in the community's response to his ministry there.

There are also big and exciting changes coming to St. Timothy as this community welcomes its new pastor. Pastor Kimberly Cooper will be starting this month to bring her ministry and vision and energy and experience to work together to transform both the church and the Wayne community. It is a time of celebration and joy for all of us as and a great start for the new year.

Council Update

It has been an eventful 12 months. Within the span of a year, we said goodbye to our beloved pastor of 24 years, weathered a global pandemic, closed (then opened, then reclosed) our doors for the safety of our congregation, had two wonderful interim pastors who helped us to stay the course, and approved a new pastor to lead us into our next chapter.

We are pleased to announce that Kimberly Cooper has been called as our new pastor! Although she has not been ordained, we are in talks with the Bishop's office to secure a date in March. Kimberly will begin on February 1st while moving into the parsonage with one of her daughters. The rest of the family will follow on February 14th. Pastor Bernie will be staying with us through February to help with the transition.

I know there are so many questions as to how the process unfolded through the months. Although we did provide regular updates, I think it's important to give you a proper timeline as to the actions that took place to get us where we are today.

After Pastor Mountenay announced his retirement, Council began discussing the process of saying goodbye while also reaching out to the Bishop for guidance in the Call Process.

April 14 - Council's first meeting with the Bishop We discussed completing our congregational MSP (Ministry Site Profile), which is a breakdown of our church, its members, our mission, and our hopes for the future.

May 15 - The congregational survey is distributed We allowed everyone to voice their opinions on what was important to St. Timothy's, which gave us a more complete picture of our church.

May 20 - The Call Committee is selected These members are Robin Koegel, Charlie Purcel, Craig Beyer, Art DeRose, Hannah Wantula, and Fallon King, Chairperson. Based on the instructions given to us by the ELCA and the Bishop, these 6 members were chosen based on their varying backgrounds and experiences they have within the church.

July 13 - Call completes the MSP

July 19 - The MSP is approved by Council and submitted to the Bishop's office

August 13 - The References are submitted The MSP required we receive reviews from people outside our congregations. We asked Pastor Wendy Abrahamson and Rabbi Randy Mark to submit them.

September 17 - Call Committee meets with Bishop Bartholomew We discussed the process in-depth, including interviewing a candidate when one became available. We also received word that Pastor Maristela Freiberg, assistant to the Bishop, will be our contact and guide through the process.

October 14 - Finance meets with Pastor Maristela to discuss compensation guidelines

October 19 - Kimberly Cooper becomes available as a candidate for our congregations Churches are only allowed to interview one candidate at a time per ELCA protocols. If the congregation does not approve the candidate, the person is “released” from that relationship and may be contacted by another church.

October 27 - Call Committee meets with Pastor Maristela to discuss the candidate

November 12 - First Call Committee interview with Kimberly

December 1 - Second Call Committee interview with Kimberly

December 2 - Call Committee recommends Kimberly to Council

December 14 - Council interview with Kimberly Council recommends Kimberly to the congregation

January 6 - Finance meets with Kimberly to discuss the compensation package

January 16 - Town Hall Meeting

January 17 - Kimberly leads Worship Congregational Call Meeting/Vote

First and foremost, I want to thank the Lord for being the source of our strength. It has not always been easy, but I have not felt lost or alone, and that is a true blessing.

I want to thank all the council members, past and present, for being hard-working and committed to the mission of St. Timothy's.

Thank you to the Call Committee, whose work in the interview process gave us the insight we needed to get to know Kimberly.

And thank you, all of our beloved congregants. We are the St. Timothy family and I am blessed to have you all in my life.

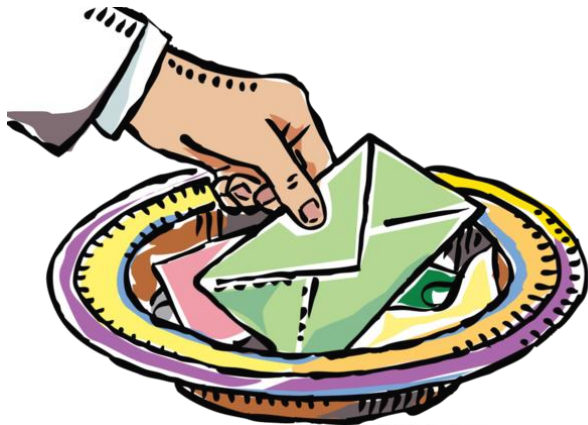
Wayne Interfaith Network

St. Timothy's Sunday School and Catechism is continuing to teach our youth during these different times. We have been blessed that we can use our talents with technology to reach all of our students. The attendance each Sunday has been better than ever before. We have discovered a new curriculum from WeAreSparkhouse.org and it is working out great. They have both non-digital and digital

formats so each class can use exactly what they need. This is the first time in many years that it follows the Liturgical Year Calendar. So that means that what they learn in Sunday School is reinforced in the weekly service.

First Communion classes will be starting February 14th under the instruction of Rich Wantula. Our three 5th graders will receive Communion for the first time on Sunday March 21st during the 10:00 service. Rich teaches our 4th and 5th grade class each week except for during this special instruction. His daughter, Hannah, will be teaching his 4th graders during the 5 weeks of instruction.

Our Sunday School and Catechism classes will be participating in a Lenten Appeal for Lutheran Disaster Response beginning on Ash Wednesday, February 17. They will be receiving boxes and information (read below) about the appeal and why it is so important to help out.

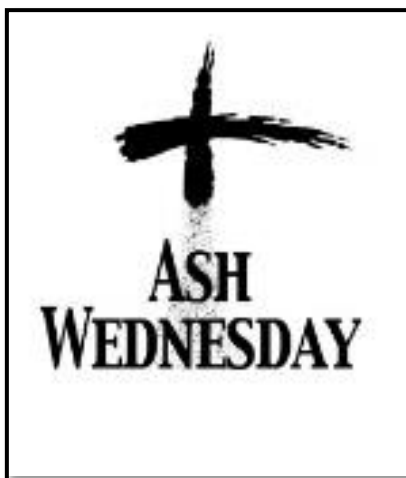

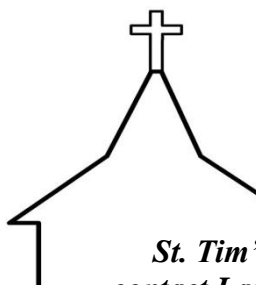
