#### A Prayer of Julian of Norwich

In you, Father all-mighty, we have our preservation and our bliss. In you, Christ, we have our restoring and our saving. You are our mother, brother, and savior. In you, our Lord the Holy Spirit, is marvelous and plenteous grace. You are our clothing; for love you wrap us and embrace us. You are our maker, our lover, our keeper. Teach us to believe that by your grace all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well. Amen

It seems that every week there is a new tragedy over which to groan. When I sit down to look at the prayers of intercession, I have to decide whether or not and how to add a petition for the latest victims of violence, war, or natural disasters. There is always something horrible going on in the world. Have things gotten worse?

Probably not. Looking back through history we can see that there have always been horrible things happening. At some point, the news media realized that the best way to grab and hold people's attention was to trigger either anger or fear. Very few contemporary news sources exist to give basic facts. Many are giving their opinions masquerading as facts. Even the ones that are doing their best to tell the truth, are selecting what true stories to share that will best engage an audience. Thus, the more "news" we watch, the more scared and/or angry we become.

One quick way to anger or terrify audiences is to point a finger at those [insert group of other people]. We love to categorize people, even ourselves at times, into groups. The divides between groups are getting bigger and the ability to be in a group and disagree with even one thing that group espouses can lead to shunning by other members.

I've had conversations with many of you in which you've told me that there are certain things you cannot discuss with friends and family, because you fear the result. You have experienced disagreeing with people that you love about certain issues and they have ridiculed you, labeled you, and cut off relations for a time. It has happened to me too and I don't like it. It is a deep pain that can take a lot of *work* to heal.

There are no easy answers, but I think that the Holy Spirit working through us *can* and *does* make a difference. I know it's hard, but the best chance we have, as people trying to follow Jesus Christ, is to begin by listening. If you aren't willing to listen to your friends and family that disagree, there is no chance of them listening to you. And I don't mean listen in order to prepare your argument. Debates do not foster trusting relationships. I mean listen with an agenda of love. Listen to them looking for ways to love them. That is the only way to restore trust in a relationship.

At the same time, we must work as individuals and community to give up our own fear and anger. We cannot love our neighbors while also fearing them. Anger is exhausting, so don't waste it on things that aren't even true. That is what so many of us are doing, when we make assumptions about what people believe. Everyone needs love. Everyone has love to give.

Some relationships may never heal completely. We may find ourselves grieving what we once had. But in the midst of that grief, rest in the knowledge that the One Who created you knows everything about you and loves you more than you could ever understand. As Julian of Norwich wrote in her famous prayer, "Teach us to believe that by your grace all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well." Amen





As with 2020 and 2021, June this year will not have any packing party, different airline itineraries, or the ability to feel our feet touch the tarmac at Sarajevo Airport. The COVID-19 pandemic and the precarious situation in Eastern Europe has made a 2022 trip impossible and forced us to rethink our program.

Bosnia-Hercegovina has been hit hard by the pandemic, and although today's infections are but 5% of the January peak, 10% of BiH has been infected, and there will be some time before it is safe to go there.

As Bosnia celebrates its 30<sup>th</sup> year of independence, separatists and Putin supporters throughout Republika Srpska are seriously looking to secede and join with Serbia. Our representative at the UN, Linda Thomas-Greenfield made a statement this month (included below) warning that ethno-nationalists on both sides are causing a very dangerous threat to Bosnia's territorial integrity. Rallies in Banja Luka have taken place in favor of Vladimir Putin as Serbia's ally. Republika Srpska's President Mirolad Dodik has taken advantage of a 31% unemployment rate and the current worldwide economic meltdown to foment a political climate that could explode.

So where does this leave us?

Our Mission of Peace and Reconciliation is far from over. Our commitment to the children and all people of Bosnia, be they Serbs, Bosniaks, Croats and Roma people is strong. New strategies, new ideas are the task of the Leadership Team.

In the fall we will meet to pray, to discuss how best to serve this little nation that we all love so much.

Please pray with us that Peace (*Mir*) will prevail (not just in Bosnia but in Ukraine of course) and Tyranny will be defeated.

#### AS DELIVERED

I shall now make a statement in my capacity as the Representative of the United States.

Thank you, so much, High Representative, for your briefing to the Council today. And thank you, President Dzaferovic, for your participation in this meeting. High Representative Schmidt, the United States welcomes your report. Your report is in line with precedent and the requirements of Security Council Resolution 1031. Moreover, your assessments are incredibly valuable. You have ensured that the international community is informed about the situation on the ground. You have done an admirable job under difficult circumstances, and especially as Europe's security is threatened by Russia's brutal war against Ukraine.

Twenty-seven years ago, the United States helped forge the Dayton Peace Accords. The Accords remain vital to the maintenance of international peace and security because what was true when Dayton was signed in 1995 remains true today: The sovereignty and territorial integrity of Bosnia and Herzegovina is paramount and unquestionable. But as we have heard today, this hard-fought stability is at risk. We agree with the High Representative's assessment that this is a dangerous path for all citizens of Bosnia and Herzegovina and the wider region.

Local political leaders are using inflammatory rhetoric, threatening to prevent or boycott elections, and refusing to tackle corruption. The United States condemns this behavior. Specifically, we should all be concerned by steps taken by Milorad Dodik and the Republika Srpska to block state institutions from implementing the will of the people and seize competencies from the state. Republika Srpska authorities are also working to withdraw from the constitutional, legal, and institutional order of the state and establish parallel frameworks.

I want to be clear: These actions are undemocratic. They are escalatory. They are not in the spirit or letter of Dayton. And they jeopardize the health, prosperity, and future of the entire country and its citizens. Calls to obstruct elections or create a new territorial organization by Bosnian Croat leaders are also dangerous and could undermine peace and security in the region.

Unfortunately, all ethno-nationalist leaders, including Bosniak parties, have chosen to employ corruption, fear, and division to stay in power. They have eroded trust in the country's institutions from within. All of the country's leaders bear responsibility for the challenges it now faces.

The United States regrets the growing division and rhetoric political parties are using to stoke tensions and distract from other issues, including wide-spread corruption. We appreciate the High Representative's efforts to calm these tensions and encourage parties to resolve differences through dialogue. Elected officials must return to good governance at all levels of government. Now is the time to advance much-needed progress on needed anti-corruption reforms, democratic reforms, economic reforms, rule of law reforms, and reconciliation.

As we have learned time and again, differences can only be resolved through dialogue in established institutions and not through obstruction and boycotts. Authorities at all levels must continue to fight against corruption, which is robbing citizens of economic growth and a more prosperous future, undermining its institutions, and hindering the country's chosen Euro-Atlantic path.

The most powerful antidote to corruption is democracy. So, we welcome the decision of the Central Election Commission to call for elections on October 2. We urge immediate allocation of funds to enable the elections to be carried out. It is the basic duty of any credible democracy to enable its citizens to exercise their right to choose their elected officials.

Finally, we want to emphasize the importance of completing the 5+2 Agenda – the requirements that must be met before the closure of the Office of the High Representative and the country's transition from international supervision. Until the 5+2 Agenda is completed, the role of the High Representative in ensuring the full implementation of the civilian aspects of the Dayton Peace Accords remain indispensable. 
