As we approach March 31, many people are preparing to recognize Transgender Day of Visibility, an international day to celebrate the contributions of transgender people and raise awareness about the deadly injustices they face.

As bishop of this church, I am concerned that the rights of transgender and nonbinary Americans have been targeted all over this nation. Nearly 400 anti-LGBTQIA+ bills were introduced across the United States in 2022, most of them targeting trans youth. That is twice the number from 2021 and almost eight times the total from 2020. The language in many of these bills attacks the humanity of trans and nonbinary people, often erasing the dignity that should be afforded to everyone.

While members of our church hold various convictions regarding gender, the teaching of our church supports legislation and policies to protect every person's human dignity and civil rights. (Human Sexuality, p. 19) As Christians we believe every human being is created in God's image, and we must honor and celebrate God's creation. Our church teaches that we affirm transgender and nonbinary siblings as God's children, who are loved unconditionally. Our social statement ***Faith, Sexism, and Justice: A Call to Action*** (2019) also declares that this church commits itself to "advocate for and support laws, policies, and practices that respect diverse bodies rather than discriminating against, objectifying, or devaluing them" (p. 60).

I urge us, as people of faith, to love our neighbors, care for the vulnerable and marginalized, and work for justice and equality. We may have differing opinions on "matters related to sexual orientation and gender identity," (FSJ, p. 61) but we must always uphold the dignity and humanity of everyone. These disagreements do not allow us to accept actions that dehumanize, discriminate against or objectify any individual or group.

We must stand together, dear church, faithfully advocating for the full humanity and dignity of all people. Let us recognize and affirm the humanity of our transgender and nonbinary siblings. Let us advocate for their dignity. Let us continue to be guided by God's love and compassion as we seek justice and equality for everyone.

*"As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience...Above all, clothe yourselves with love which binds everything together in perfect harmony." --Colossians 3: 12 &14*

It's the time of year again in which my family is excited about getting Easter dresses, shoes, nail polish. I remember as a little girl being excited to get dressed up in pastels – sometimes even with a fancy hat! Then, when I had little girls, I got to do it all over again. When they were little, I sometimes put them in matching dresses or dresses that all coordinated with one another. They outgrew a willingness to go along with my plans, but I live in hope that one day we can do something like that again.

For me growing up, and in turn my own kids, we have always participated in "the three days." Maundy Thursday was my kids favorite service, because we did foot washing. Sometimes, at our Episcopal Church, the service would run for 2 hours in order to get everyone washed up, but people would come and bring their young children (who definitely love playing in water!). We attended a Good Friday service specifically designed for children and, some years we even went to the Easter Vigil, which also goes for hours. It is a popular day for baptisms.

We were completely immersed in the stories of Jesus' last supper, crucifixion, and the redemption that God had planned. This was work we did as a family to clothe ourselves in the things listed by Paul in Colossians. Throughout those three days, year after year, we concentrated on the things that would develop:

*Compassion* – Almost all the disciples betrayed/abandoned Jesus during this time.

*Kindness* – The Savior of the world chose to wash the feet of the disciples.

*Humility* – God shows so much more love for humanity than we deserve.

*Meekness* – This is a time to engage more fully in community and let go (a bit) of ourselves.

*Patience* – Like the disciples long ago, we have to wait, each year between Friday and Sunday to experience the resurrection.

*Above all, love*, which binds us all together in perfect harmony – every year this is the hardest part. Holy Week is an intense time of preparation. We are simultaneously doing spiritual work and practical tasks around preparing for a feast. Finding the balance is tricky, but I know I'm giving too much weight to something or other, when I start snapping at the people I love – when my communication becomes more angry than loving.

This year, as you prepare for Easter, keep in mind that the fancy clothes, the chocolate, and the bunnies are just meant to be fun. Don't let the preparations distract from the beauty of the season. Take time to really think about what resurrection means. Unlike my hopes that all three of my daughters will wear matching dresses, my hope in Jesus is never frustrated. He will always resurrect on that first Easter morning.

## **Meditation with Movement ~ Every Tuesday**

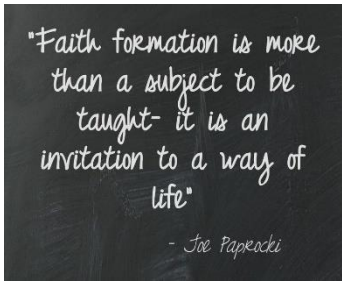
### **Our Tuesday group has room for more!**

## Heart 'n Hands Mission

As part of our monthly collection of personal care items, in April we are asking for donations of toothbrushes and toothpaste, travel and full-size. Thank you for your continuing generous support of our mission!



This month begins a series to introduce you to our partner organizations that benefit from your continuing support of Heart 'n Hands Mission. Our first is Community Outreach Services, Inc. in Paterson.

Community Outreach Services, Inc., began in 2006 when Rev. Wayne Brown took a phone call from a woman who wished to donate a box of food to the hungry. Rev. Brown soon realized the extent of hunger and homelessness in the community and accepted the challenge to establish a food ministry. Over the next several months, Rev. Brown and his wife Elisa brought food to hundreds of families in the community.

In 2010 Rev. Brown formally established Community Outreach Services, Inc. as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit and moved it into the facility on 6th Avenue in Paterson, NJ. Today, thanks to donors and volunteers like you, Community Outreach Services serves over 1,200 families per month, providing nutritious food, warm clothing, job assistance and referral assistance for help with utilities, rent and household furniture.

We were saddened to learn of the sudden death of Rev. Brown last month. He was a warm and caring man and always expressed heartfelt thanks for all that we provided to his outreach ministry. His wife, children, and supporters are continuing his legacy of assistance and we will continue to support them. Please join us in offering prayers for his family. May God grant him eternal rest.

## WIN Food Pantry



The WIN Food Pantry operating today has its roots in a food pantry opened in 1984 as a result of the devastating Passaic River flood of that year. While we haven't changed much operationally, we continue to serve an increasing number of individuals and families.

Our food pantry is stocked through the very generous donations of our WIN members and their congregations, the community and many individual donations along with the support of various businesses and service organizations throughout Wayne, NJ and the surrounding areas.

The primary purpose of the WIN Food Pantry is to distribute non-perishable nutritious food to eligible area residents in need. We also provide various cleaning supplies and personal care products, as available. Eligible individuals and families can obtain assistance once a month. Our goal is to provide supplemental assistance on an as-needed basis. Some individuals and families have a short term need while others may be in need of more prolonged assistance.

The pantry itself is not open to the public. Volunteers pack bags of food and other items based on the supplies available as well as the needs of the household. Pantry clients are called when their food is ready to be picked up.

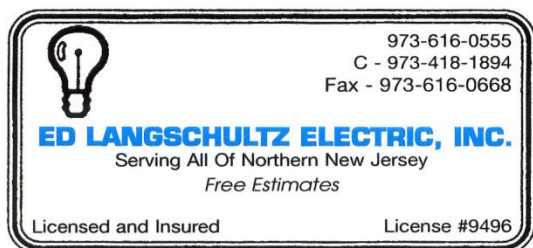
