"The bible is the cradle wherein Christ is laid." – Martin Luther

Martin Luther, and other reformers of his day, argued that scripture should be the primary tool for guiding the church. He did not agree with the Vatican that tradition (or dogma) was equal in importance with the bible. Luther held up the church's dogma and compared it to the bible. Anywhere that he saw a discrepancy, he gave greater authority to the bible and argued against the tradition. He didn't want to throw out all the traditions – only those that he saw as explicitly contrary to scripture.

The challenge, however, in honoring the authority of the bible, is that some pretty bad things have been motivated by bible verses (slavery, racism, crusades, the inquisition, etc.). In recent years, I've seen mugs and magnets that read, "I can do all things through a verse taken out of context." It's a play on Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" - a verse that is regularly and egregiously quoted out of context. The use of bible verses to argue our own point of view can be dangerous when our own point of view is sinful.

So, how is a lay person to know what the bible really says? And how can someone know, if the interpretation of a verse or passage is helpful or harmful? Martin Luther said to look for the *canon within the canon* – THE GOSPEL. We are to use the Word to interpret the word. We ground ourselves in Christ first. Martin Luther explained the gospel as Jesus clothing us in righteousness and putting on our sin. We use that as a filter to understand everything else we read.

I take it a step further, because, in truth, some dedicated Lutherans have used Lutheran theology to interpret the bible and still come up with some pretty poor interpretations. So, what I do, is consider the two greatest commandments as Jesus said, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul and with all your mind" and "*the second is just like it*, you shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22)

Each time I sit down to read scripture, I do so with these two twin viewpoints:

1. God loves all of humanity enough to be crucified with us and by us.

2. We are instructed to love God and all of humanity.

There are some passages and stories that easily back up these viewpoints. Others require a lot of prayer. I call this leaning on the Holy Spirit. When I come across a passage that is violent or disturbing, I ask the Holy Spirit to help me see God's love at work. So far, I have always found it.

I have heard from a number of you that reading the bible is intimidating or boring. There are places that are hard to understand. Other places can get a bit bogged down in details. So, I want to give you some suggestions of places to start: The *Letters*¹ of John (1, 2, and 3) are short and very sweet. It is in 1 John 4: 19 that we have the beautiful words: "we love because he first loved us." All three books are encouraging and empowering.

The Letter of James, the biological brother of Jesus and head of the church in Jerusalem. This book is heavy on guidance – how to follow Christ in the world. Martin Luther wasn't a big fan, but I am.

Paul's letter to the Romans is his masterpiece. In this letter he is especially clear on justification by the work of Jesus Christ. Take this one slow. Some might find it boring, but it is well worth a try. It is here that we find these words:

Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Romans 8: 35, 37-39

You don't have to read the bible like other books. The bible is best taken in small bites instead of big chunks. Just read a few verses at a time. If you have any questions about what you are reading, come find me and ask. We can look for answers together. If you want more suggestions than those provided above, come ask me. These are just starting points.

In order to further encourage you to do this, every single person that comes to tell me they have read the bible (outside of church) will get a prize (rules and exclusions may apply²). Talk to you soon!

¹ Not to be confused with the one Gospel according to John – entirely different and written by a different person.

² Just kidding. There are no exclusions – that's the gospel.

Dear All,

The St Timothy Endowment Committee is asking you, the congregation, for suggestions for the 2023 endowment benevolent allocation.

Background: St. Timothy Lutheran Church's ministry extends beyond the walls of the sanctuary and into the local and world community. St. Timothy established the Endowment Fund in 2013 through the generosity of Ms. Marie Forester, as St. Timothy was named as beneficiary of her estate.

Purpose: To strengthen and extend God's mission, reaching out in response to human need, locally, nationally, and globally.

Allocation: The Committee is responsible for the annual allocation of endowment dividend funds (\$5,794.00 this year) which is 1/3 of retained earnings as 2022 was a loss year. Of the 1/3, half (\$2,897) of the total dividends will be determined by the committee and the other half (\$2,897) is to be determined by the congregation.

Requirements: Funds can only be given to legally qualified recipients; no funds can be used for St. Timothy's normal operating expenses. Requests can be made for special projects of the congregation, capital improvements for the congregation and other purposes.

For our donations to have the greatest impact please consider giving to the local chapters of national and global organizations.

Due Date: **May 31st**. There will be a suggestion box in the back of the Narthex. You will be asked to list one local, one national and one global charity and also include your name on the ballots provided. You may cast your ballot by placing it in the box in the Narthex, mailing it to the church "Attn. Endowment Committee", or emailing it to <u>st.tims395@yahoo.com</u>.



Meditation with Movement ~ Every Tuesday



I must ask those who are willing to eventually engage with our family to let me share your email address with NJIC. This is not a commitment for any specific task but that you are willing to be "on the list' to help in-person as able. For example, setting up the house or apartment, providing transportation, helping set up a bank account, registering kids in school etc. Many things we have done for ourselves but can now do for another.

NJIC recently met with CWS (Church World Service) who coordinates assistance and placement of refugee families on a Zoom conference. It is an hour long presentation and Q&A session I encourage you to view. It explains the process and what cosponsorship entails. Heart 'n Hands Mission

This month we are introducing you to another of our partner organizations that benefit from your continuing support of Heart 'n Hands Mission – Christhouse, part of the St. Luke Community Development Corporation of Paterson. Heart 'n Hands Mission

connected with Christhouse in February 2022 through Fallon King Goskowski, whose grandmother is a member of St. Luke Baptist Church in Paterson

St. Luke CDC was established by St. Luke Baptist Church in 1997 under the direction of the Rev. Kenneth D.R. Clayton. The mission of SLCDC is to serve as an agent of hope, help and healing in the City of Paterson. *"We exist to improve the quality of life of city residents, create a better community and to empower individuals to live self-sufficient lifestyles with the proper skills and tools to live."*

Christhouse opened in 1998 as a Food and Clothing Distribution Center. The center provides fresh food and quality pre-owned clothes to community residents in need. Food is provided by community donations and local partnerships including the North Jersey Food Bank. Clothing is provided by private donations and through other local partnerships. They serve more than 300 local families each month, providing support to 1500 people. Currently, 75% of their clients are refugees resettling in the community.





Director Danny Webster leads a team of twenty volunteers at Christhouse to prepare clothing, stock the pantry shelves, and guide clients in selecting food and clothing. He began volunteering in 2016 and became director in September 2021. A lifelong member of St. Luke's Baptist Church, Danny grew up in Paterson, and with his father had a neighborhood barber shop for many years and has always been a part of the local community.

Danny feels blessed to be chosen for this work and is passionate about their mission. He energetically encourages the team to provide cheerful service in a friendly and compassionate setting, and wants everyone to enjoy coming to Christhouse. His dedication and joy come from providing light as an example of God's grace.



This spring, Danny is leading the team in creating a community vegetable garden in the yard adjacent to their building. With help from community members, they will grow fresh produce to supplement their weekly food distributions. Children attending St. Luke's summer camp program will also help, learning first-hand about gardening and farming.
