But Ruth said, "Do not press me to leave you or to turn back from following you! Where you go, I will go; where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God my God. Where you die, I will die – there will I be buried. May the Lord do thus and so to me, and more as well, if even death parts me from you!"

Ruth 1: 16-17

The longer I spend doing ministry in this world, the more I have come to believe that the worst thing that can happen in life is to be lonely. I meet with people every week, who describe to me their loneliness. Teens going to school every day talk about being lonely. Elderly people, who lived long lives devoted to their families talk about being lonely. Even young professionals so busy that they don't know how they can fit everything in the hours of the day talk about being lonely.

The problem isn't lack of access to people. It is lack of authenticity and vulnerability with people. So much of us are taught that production is the purpose of life, when in fact, God created us to be in relationship. We cannot have real relationships without showing our vulnerabilities. Few of us can afford to do that at our place of employment. Employers want to see us perform well. They only want to know our weaknesses in order to determine if they can live with it or work with us to overcome it.

Churches could be an excellent answer for society. We offer opportunities to connect in many different ways, and yet, people are hesitant to want that. One reason is a lack of interest in connecting. Many people from school age to retirement are more focused on succeeding, earning, and/or impressing. It is downright countercultural to focus on relationships.

I don't think the answer is to try and compete with forms of entertainment. We are not going to win against sports, concerts, or social clubs. Church just isn't very entertaining to most people in this day and age. What we do have, though, is the gospel of Jesus Christ. We do have the deep knowledge that the One that created us thinks we are great and wants to be close to us. For a world groaning in loneliness, we are one place that doesn't have to be about competition. In God's realm, everyone is a winner.

Some people don't like that. Some people want to be winners and they seek out ways to be winners – even setting up others as losers. That can make it so much harder to be our authentic selves. We are scared to open ourselves up to judgement. And yet, it is so refreshing to be around people that are willing to be different, unique, and completely who God made them to be.

Christ calls us to seek out those labeled losers and bring them into loving community. Reading through his family tree, you will be surprised at some of the names – people that you might think do not belong in a good upstanding family: prostitutes, murderers, and, in the case of Ruth, a Moabite (not even Israelite). And yet, she stood by Naomi caring for her, when Naomi's biological (Israelite) relatives did not.

One of the best things you can do, as a Christ follower, is to bring people into the community of faith or, if that isn't possible, bring the community to them. Call them, visit them, or send them cards. Be present and be real. Don't worry about individuals, who reject you, because I can promise you that your church and your God think you are absolutely amazing. You have a lot to offer the world. We have a lot to offer the world.



Bookworms ~ September 16th

The first novel by Anthony Doerr, the highly acclaimed, multiple award-winning author of *Cloud Cuckoo Land*, and the Pulitzer Prize-winning #1 *New York Times* bestseller *All the Light We Cannot See*, one of the most beautiful, wise, and compelling debuts of recent times.

David Winkler begins life in Anchorage, Alaska, a quiet boy drawn to the volatility of weather and obsessed with snow. Sometimes he sees things before they happen—a man carrying a hatbox will be hit by a bus; Winkler will fall in love with a woman in a supermarket. When David dreams that his infant daughter will drown in a flood as he tries



to save her, he comes undone. He travels thousands of miles, fleeing family, home, and the future itself, to deny the dream.

On a Caribbean island, destitute, alone, and unsure if his child has survived or his wife can forgive him, David is sheltered by a couple with a daughter of their own.
